Playwright on hand for thriller

Players 'Stay' to open this Friday

Everything appears ordinary in the domestic life on stage when the Wimberley Players open the new psychological thriller, Stay, on Sept. 13 at the Wimberley Playhouse. But as the story unfolds, it morphs into finely wrought suspense with an unexpected twist.

The playwright Sheila Cowley will join the Players for the Texas premiere of the show, which runs weekends through Oct. 6. On Saturday Sept. 14. she'll greet guests in the lobby beginning at 6:45 and give a talk-back after the performance. Cowley is an award-winning audio producer at WMNF 88.5 FM Tampa, and author of numerous radio dramas.

The actor Deanna Lalich appears as Leanne Abrams, a sensitive, steadfast surgeon who finds a deep purpose battling the blindness of others. Mark Abrams (played by Aaron Johnson) is a globetrotting journalist who brings the news of the world each week to his radio audience. Once they were so perfect for each other. But Mark has news of a more personal nature these days. He is about to become a father and not with his wife Leanne, but with co-worker, Sandra Kinsky (played by Leigh Shelton).

Exhausted from travel and the rigors of international conflict, Mark winds his way to the home he shared with Leanne. There, with the woman who knows his every preference, he remembers the good times they shared. In reality, this visit is Mark's

"We all know when an actor delivers a playwright's line that rings with truth; when that awareness surfaces, we connect," he said. "When you hear the dialogue of Stay you realize that this is how people actually talk; they finish each others sentences, they interrupt, they joke in code, and they communicate in a verbal shorthand that comes from being familiar with each other."





Acting shines in new show by Wimberley Players

The Wimberley Players is the first Texas theater to produce the original show written by Sheila Cowley, Stay. The show takes place in the home and office of Leeanne Abrams who is dealing with the aftermath of her husband's (Mark) infidelity and subsequent inpregnating of his mistress and boss, Sandra Kinsky.

Stay is a psychological thriller that boasts very realistic dialogue. Directed by David McCullers, who was last seen on the Wimberley Players stage in Death of Salesman, Stay follows Leeane, played by Deanna Lalich, as she tricks her husband into staying with her for as long as


she can keep him.

After talking with her co-worker and friend, Ben Cohen (played by Will Mercer), Leeanne, an eye doctor, starts to play around with the idea that a serious injury can help keep a marriage together. She drugs her husband (played by Aaron Johnson), fakes a car accident and wraps his eyes in guaze and tells him when he wakes up that shards of glass penetrated both of his eyes and that he needs to rest for a few days. She tells him everything will be okay just as he has spent the first few minutes of the show reassuring her while handing her divorce papers and packing up his things.

A few days later, Leeanne regretfully informs Mark that she indeed had to operate while suspiciously telling Cohen that she managed to fix one of her patients who needed an eye

donor.

The events culminate when Mark's mistress (played by Leigh Shelton) returns from a trip to find her blind flance staying at his soon-to-be-ex wife's hosue.

She demands that they leave and after Mark returns to collect the signed divorce papers, Leeanne performs one final act of love.

Lighting and sound for the show work beautifully. Bill Peeler is the lighting designer and Johnson is the sound designer. The set, designed by Scott Wade, also works really well for the show. Rain is a theme throught the play and the rain hitting against Leeane's window really puts the audience inside her house.

But the acting is what really shines throughout the show. Johnson and Lalich perform flashbacks on stage, going from two people in the middle of a divorce to two people happily married and in love right in front of the audience's eyes. The dialogue is so realistic and the delivery, body language and facial expressions force the audience to feel what the characters are feeling.

For fans of heartstring-pulling shows, this is a must see.

Stay will be showing for two more weekends through Oct. 6. Friday and Saturday shows start at 7:30 p.m. and Sunday shows start at 2:30 p.m.




